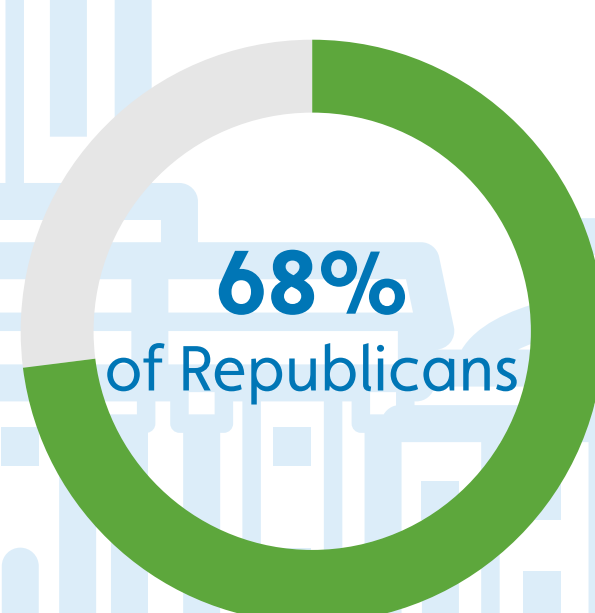
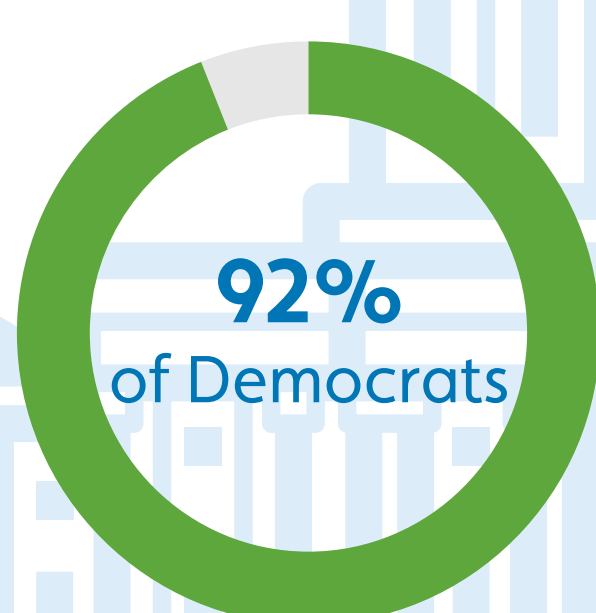


## 4 in 5 voters think increasing funding for Medicaid amid COVID-19 should be a priority for Congress



### That includes...



Only 6% think Congress should not increase funding for Medicaid.

75% of voters think increasing Medicaid funding should be a priority for the Biden-Harris Administration in its first 100 days.

As Medicaid enrollment continues to increase due to the economic impact of the COVID-19 crisis, over three quarters of voters (78%) think it is better for lawmakers to increase spending on public programs like Medicaid rather than decrease spending.



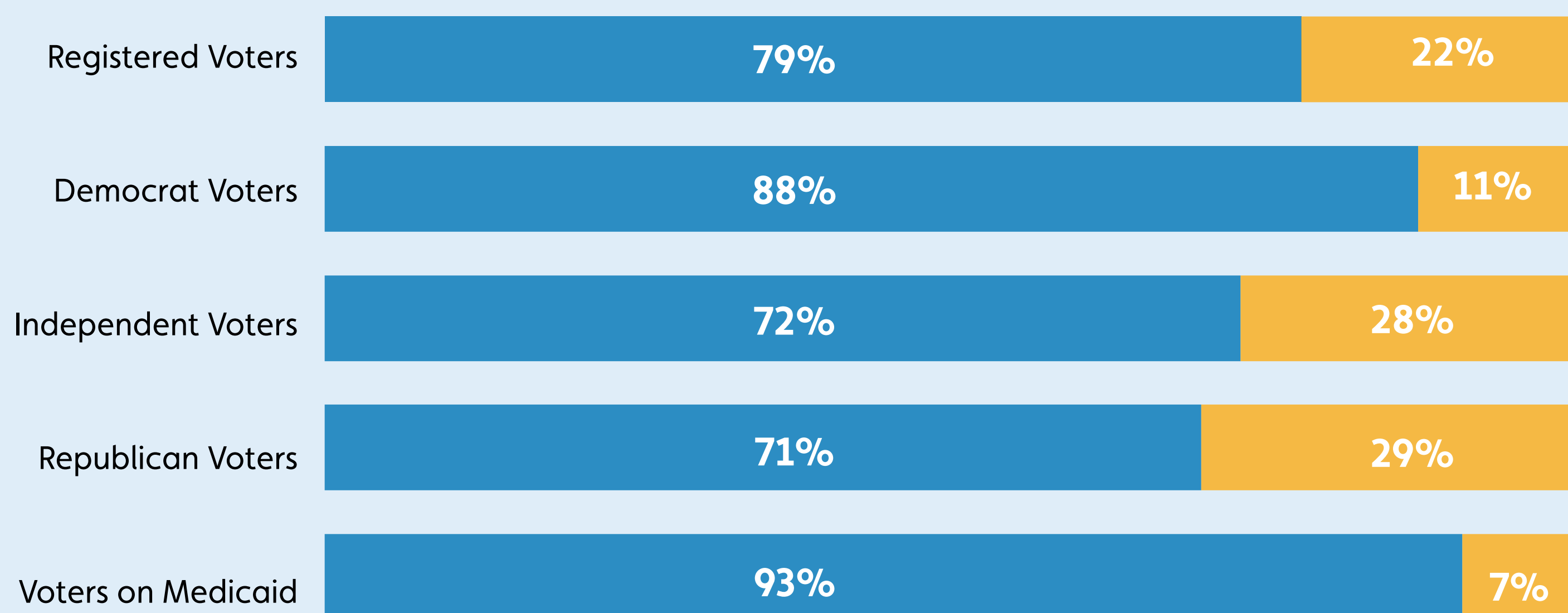
### Impact of Medicaid Funding on the Vote

A Congress member's decision to support funding for Medicaid positively impacts voters support. A majority of voters (59%) say they would be more likely to support their member of Congress if he/she supported increased funding for Medicaid.



### Voters Are Concerned About Cuts to Medicaid Benefits

A majority of voters (63%) think we should ensure Medicaid is strong and stable

to help the growing number of Americans who rely on Medicaid for health insurance during the COVID-19 crisis.



Morning Consult, on behalf of the Modern Medicaid Alliance, conducted an online survey among a national sample of 1,995 registered voters between February 4-8, 2020. The data were weighted to approximate a target sample of registered voters based on age, race, gender, educational attainment, and region. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 2%.
