35% State








What's at Stake

The proposed Medicaid cuts outlined in H.R. 1 would strip health coverage away from Kansas residents and force significant economic trade-offs, leaving taxpayers footing the bill to cover funding gaps.

The combination of cuts included in the bill would **reduce federal**Medicaid funding to Kansas by 8%, totaling roughly \$3 billion over the next decade.⁴

Projected Medicaid Coverage Loss in Kansas⁵

If Congress enacts the proposed Medicaid cuts, up to **38,000 Kansans** could lose coverage. Even under the most conservative estimate, **over 23,000 people** would be pushed out of the program as a result of eligibility restrictions, administrative red tape and reduced funding for outreach and enrollment efforts.



Estimated Economic Impact of Medicaid Work Requirements in Kansas⁶

Work requirements would limit Medicaid eligibility and result in a reduction in economic activity, shrink the workforce and undercut state and local tax revenues.

\$4M - \$5.6M
